A Brief History




The Land

Red Sucker Lake First Nation is located on a peninsula of the northeast shore of Red Sucker Lake, near the Manitoba-Ontario border. The community is situated approximately 700 km northeast of Winnipeg, and 224 km southeast of Thompson, Manitoba. The Oji-Cree Nation has a registered population of 1,085, of which, 939 live on-reserve. The main reserve for Red Sucker Lake First Nation is Red Sucker Lake 1976. The First Nation also occupies seven other separate reserves located around Red Sucker Lake.

The First Nation is located in the Hayes River Upland - one of four ecoregions that make up Canada's Boreal Shield ecozone. Within this ecoregion, Red Sucker Lake is located within the Island Lake ecodistrict. The Island Lake ecodistrict is characterized by an uneven geography featuring a mixture of rock outcrops and coarse glacial till. The area features occasional peat bogs - some deep enough that permafrost is present. Vegetation typically consists of black spruce, jack pine, balsam bir, and occasionally trembling aspen and white spruce. Bogs and other wetlands feature more varied plant species.

The main languages spoken by the population are Oji-Cree and English. The traditional Oji-Cree name for Red Sucker Lake is Mithkwamepin Thaakkahikan, meaning the "lake of red suckers. This refers to the relative abundance of sucker species among the fish identified in the lake now known as Red Sucker Lake.

Our clean environment, and well behaved students. Our students are very respectful, and will do things that are asked of them.





The majority of children living in the community attend the Red Sucker Lake School, with the exception of a few high school students who attend Southeast Collegiate in Winnipeg.

Excitingly, we are in the process of receiving materials for the construction of our own High School, which will be completed in 2025-26. The existing school will be renovated to become an Elementary School.

Teacherages

We have eight teacherages, three of which are 3-bedroom units, with the other five being 2-bedroom units. If sharing a unit with another teacher, rent is half the cost of a nonshared unit. The units are equipped with kitchen appliances, furniture, and a washing machine and dryer. Teachers should bring pots, pans, dishes, and household linens. Satellite TV (requires a television) and Internet cost extra.

What is the pet policy?

Teachers are not able to bring their pets to the community.

We have a lot of good fishing in our lake. The common fish we have are northern pike, walleyes, lake trout, whitefish, suckers, and red suckers.

We are a Christian community. We have two churches and a community Sacred Grounds which are used for prayer.

Is there a hockey arena?

The arena is available anytime of the day. In the summer, the arena is used for other sports.

Sources of information for what is going on in the community?

There is a local TV Channel and radio station. We also have Facebook Groups, including the School's, and a community Buy and Sell.

How can teachers order/receive packages and goods in the community?

Shipments come in 5 days a week. We recommend using Harris Meats & Groceries, or Cantor's Quality Meats & Groceries.









Event highlight: Wapisee River Gathering

Residents of Red Sucker Lake and nearby communities come together for the annual Red Sucker Lake Wapisee River Gathering, a weeklong event in August that is filled with traditional and cultural activities. The River Gathering involves a variety of events centered on camping and preparing traditional food.

Each day of the weeklong celebration presents its own form of exciting events, games, and activities hosted by different community offices and organizations, including fishing derbies, traditional dancing, karaoke, live music, a rowing race and an airplane envelope drop. Residents camp at the mouth of the Wapisee River, which is located about 1.5 km south west of Red Sucker Lake, and is only accessible via boat.

This gathering place has historical significance. It has been used for generations as a waypoint before dispersing to each family's hunting grounds. Each clan would wait there for others before travelling together to the Hudson's Bay outpost in Island Lake to engage in fur trade. In the springtime, people would meet at the island before going to their own traplines. As explained by a community representative, communities have long used the island as a place of healing, and as a gathering place.



The First Nation presently has no year-round road access, and as a result, experiences a higher cost of transportation. The nearest service center is located 450 km away. The community is accessible by winter road from Garden Hill First Nation (3-4 hrs). The winter road also connects them to the First Nations of Theresa Point, Wasagamack, God's Lake Narrows, and Bunibonibee Cree Nation. The existing school and teacherages are connected to water and sewer utilities, 52 houses rely on trucked water cistern and sewage services, 157 households have water trucked to barrels and no sewage service.

The community's geographic zone classification is zone 4, having no year-round road access to the nearest service center, and as a result a higher cost of transportation. The community exhibits an environmental index of C6 (between 50 and 55 degrees latitude).
