chool History



Keewaytinook Internet High School was created in 2000 at the request of the chiefs of Keewaytinook Okimakanak (Northern Chiefs Tribal Council). The chiefs saw that there were many issues with the practice, at the time, of sending youth out of their communities to attend high school in Thunder Bay, Sioux Lookout, or Dryden. Many felt these students were too young to be away from their families and communities. Thus, KiHS began as a grade 9 program. In the years since, it has evolved into a full grade 9 to 12 program for on reserve youth and mature students. Since 2006 there have been many graduates of KiHS, both young and mature, and the range of choices offered to students has grown to surpass the choices they have in most urban schools.




How it works

KiHS students attend their community classrooms and work on a variety of courses using the online platform Moodle.

Their community teacher is responsible for supporting students in their courses, and also for developing and delivering courses online in their subject area. Thus, a teacher in North Spirit Lake might be working with her local students in a variety of courses, while at the same time delivering English courses to all KiHS students in all communities. This is possible because the instruction is asynchronous, meaning the lessons are not delivered live. Students have access to the entire week's work starting on Monday and work at their own pace to complete the work.





Typically, teachers and students all go home for lunch. It is expected that KiHS teachers will arrive at school by 8:30 AM. Additional hours are often required in the classroom, to provide extra homework help and to manage course writing and marking and administrative duties. KiHS classrooms span two different time zones (eastern and central).

KiHS is a Ministry inspected school that uses a blended-learning model to delivery over 80 courses to students in 15 partner community. Similar to an urban high school, the secondary school offers locally developed, applied, and academic courses in grades 9 and 10, as well as compulsory and elective courses in grades 11 and 12, including university preparation courses. As a community-based program, it has the ability to offer students land-based and cultural activities, as well as support from local elders.











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
