The Land

Woodland Cree First Nation is made up of four reserves in northern Alberta: Cadotte Lake, Simon Lake, Golden Lake, and Marten Lake. We are located 85 kilometres northeast of Peace River and 500 kilometres northwest of Edmonton.

Our First Nation's Tapaminamasoyahk Ketaskenow Land Code was the 104th Framework Agreement signatory to regain land governance through the land code of our 16106 hectares—the first in Alberta! The new land code will help protect our land and allow us to sustainably and responsibly maintain it for future generations.

Around Woodland Cree First Nation, you will see moose, deer, beaver, muskrat, swan, bear, fish, berries, and medicinal plants. There are plenty of recreational and hunting opportunities available.

1989	August 28: The Woodland Cree First Nation # 474 is created. Interim Chief, Melvin Laboucan, initiated the forming of the new band. Interim Councillors were: Archie Cardinal, John W. Cardinal, Roy Letendre, and William Thomas
1991	The Woodland Cree Chief and Council signed the Adhesion to Treaty No. 8 on September 24th, 1991
1992	The lands were surveyed and reserves were established. Key infrastructure was built and the delivery of programs and services began. The school was operated by the Northland School Division #60 under a Tuition Agreement
	September 22: Woodland Cree First Nation began to operate the community school
1995	The Woodland Cree #474, Loon River #478, and Whitefish Lake #459 First Nations formed the Kee Tas Kee Now Tribal Council (KTC). Long-term Contribution Agreements for essential program services were negotiated with the Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC)
Late 1900s	The Woodland Cree First Nation took control of the delivery of Education. The 4-Ward Board of Education was established with representation from Simon Lake, Cadotte Lake, Marten Lake, and the Métis
2017	June: The Kee Tas Kee Now Tribal Council Education Authority (KTCEA) was established. It took over 3 Band Operated Schools – Clarence Jaycox, Cadotte Lake, and Atikameg
2019	June: The Chiefs of Loon River, Lubicon Lake, Peerless Trout, Whitefish Lake and Woodland Cree sign a 10-year KTCEA Funding Agreement with the Federal Government
2024	June: Woodland Cree First Nation presents a Band Council Resolution to leave the Education Authority and pursue Treaty-Based Education. Gakino'amaage: Teach For Canada is adopted as a hiring and employment partner to support this approach

Cadotte Lake Learning Centre accommodates Kindergarten to Grade 12. We are proud to offer access to hundreds of acres of forests, and daily breakfast and lunch programs for students and staff.

School Mandate

"We, the Woodland Cree people, will develop and maintain a self-supporting community for our children, which respects the individual, all people, the environment and other communities."

What is your school proud of?

Cadotte Lake Learning Centre is proud to be operating as a band-operated school beginning in 2024-2025 with the support of Woodland Cree First Nation. We have partnered with the Indigenous Knowledge & Wisdom Centre to research how communities might work together with partners in education to deliver Treaty-Based Education.

School Facilities

We have traditional classroom spaces at our K-12 learning centre, a Career and Technology Supports portable classroom with musical instruments and sewing machines. There is a full-size gymnasium with workout equipment, high-speed wifi and hundreds of acres of forests.

Extracurricular activities and clubs

Guitar/Percussion, Indigenous Games, Ceramics and Pottery Yoga and Daily Physical Activities, Volleyball, Hockey, Basketball, Track and Field, Swimming, Canoeing, Traditional Dance, Travel Club, Music and Choir, Nutrition or Cooking Clubs, Dungeons and Dragons, Anime Club.



Summer School

Our Summer School experience is one-of-a-kind

Learning on the Mighty Peace River

The Cadotte Lake Learning Centre offers the coolest summer school ever in the traditional Voyageur canoes on the Mighty Peace River.

Partnering with the Canadian Voyageur Brigade Society, Woodland Cree First Nation provides this unique outdoor learning experience for Grades 10-12 annually during July.





Teacherages



The teacherages range from family duplexes to single-trailer homes. They are furnished with basic kitchen equipment, furniture, laundry facilities, appliances, and drinkable water and are within walking distance of our health centre, school and band office.

We have high-speed wifi. Teachers typically have their own private units. Teachers are encouraged to bring bedding, toiletries, television, cleaning supplies and cooking supplies to support their dietary preferences. Rent is included but a damage deposit of \$1000 is required.

Pet Policy

Staff are welcome to bring their domestic pets, but must adhere to the community's pet policy.

A Day in the Life of a Teacher

The day begins at 7:45 AM and teachers have 30 minutes to prepare for the first bus to arrive. Three buses come to the school and students begin with breakfast and a circle song and welcome from our Elders. Teachers will be provided team teaching opportunities whereby they can support mixed-grade classrooms of approximately 15-20 students. Kindergarten is our language nest and taught as Cree Immersion for a full day. Students will have two formal recesses and staff rotate their supervision time on our new playground and field. All teachers are provided with planning and release time each day with the exception of extreme staffing shortages or special days.

Staff teach until 4:00 PM. There are opportunities for extra-curricular coaching and coaches are remunerated for these roles. Evening community events are posted in advance and while they are not mandatory for staff, we highly encourage them to consider investing in proactive community building and cultural participation here at Woodland Cree First Nation. All staff will be invited to take Cree Language classes with our Elders if they are interested in learning our community language.

We have created a four-day schedule where Fridays are either off of work or professional development on a biweekly basis. On Fridays, our students will be participating in physical education and/or land-based learning experiences with our neighbouring partners, regional coaches and community Elders.

Elder, Mother, Kokum

I am proud to be an Elder at the school. I share my knowledge and give our students access to Indigenous ways of learning and being.

I started this role earlier this year and it warms my heart that students already call me kokum (grandma). I aim to make myself available to the students so that they know that there is always a warm person, an Elder looking out for and caring for them.

This is just one of the many ways that I serve my community. I am Secretary for our Elder's Council and was part of the committee that made history by ratifying our own Land Code which asserts our sovereignty over our lands.

One of my favourite times of the year is in the summer when we hold our Woodland Cree Elders Gathering in Otter River. A lot of us Elders participate and will camp on the land for it. Some activities include painting, making dreamcatchers, beadwork, knife throwing, axe throwing and archery.

I look forward to getting to know you and having you become part of our community!

All major restaurants and stores can be found 45 minutes away in Peace River.

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
