ELDERS-IN-RESIDENCE

Bernard Nelson, also known as Gizhii Manitou Gaamik, "Spirit of the Earth," is Ojibway-Cree from Eabametoong First Nation. He is a survivor of the Pelican Lake Indian Residential School and currently resides in Kingston, Ontario with his wife, Tammy.

Bernard is a long-time Men's Traditional Dancer, Eagle Staff Carrier, and Sundancer. He and Tammy work with Indigenous students from across Canada and are connected to the military, school boards, cultural camps, and various youth groups.

Tammy Nelson, also known as Mem mem a ze waa bik kwe, "Keeper of the Water," is an Ojibway woman from Nipissing First Nation and a long-time Women's Traditional Dancer. Together, they are blessed with a blended family of nine children and several grandchildren.

Both Bernard and Tammy were awarded the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal and, more recently, the King Charles III Coronation Medal for their leadership in community work. Their way of life includes "Walking the Red Road" and living by the Seven Grandfather Teachings. Much of their time is spent with community, in ceremony, at powwows, teaching, and crafting. They are passionate about working with both Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.

Bernard and Tammy have served as Elders-in-Residence for our Gakino'amaage Summer Enrichment Program every year since our first session in 2015.

Kristin Ward is currently the Assistant Director of Education for Lac Seul First Nation. Prior to her current role, she has worked as a principal, teacher, and as a special education teacher in both First Nations schools, and in the provincial school system. Kristin is a strong advocate for trauma-informed inclusive schools that ensure all students feel safe, supported, and respected. Kristin has recently led a project to create a land-based curriculum for the elementary schools in Lac Seul that connects to the Ontario Curriculum.



Laura Maracle

INDIGENOUS HISTORIES OF TURTLE ISLAND Monday, July 14 1:00 PM - 4:00 PM EDT

Laura Maracle is a mixed-race woman who has made the conscious decision to live according to Haudenosaunee tradition. Her biological father was an Anishinaabe man and her mother is of French/Irish descent. The father who raised Laura is Mohawk, and that is how she knows Tyendinaga as her home today. Laura was born and raised in Toronto, where she spent the first 22 years of her life. Thereafter, she claimed her identity, language, and culture (to the best of her ability) and has been sitting (with the Bear Clan) and learning in the longhouse with the traditional Haudenosaunee people of Tyendinaga.

Laura's work experience is diverse and covers the fields of administration, legal secretary (corporate and criminal law), First Nation employment and education. Her passion, heart, and soul lie in the field of Aboriginal education. Having taught from early childhood right up to adult education, the biggest life lessons she has gained came from teaching atrisk youth at the high school level. Most recently Laura's path has led her to the field of education and social work.



Susannah Walker

Susannah Walker is an enrolled citizen of the Waganakising Odawa tribe from northern Michigan and her grandmother's family is from the Santee Sioux (Dakota) Nation of Nebraska. She worked as a K-12 teacher in Texas and Medellin, Colombia for five years and completed her Master of Social Work in 2012 at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she interned with the North Carolina Commission on Indian Affairs. In 2011, she completed a summer internship with her tribe in the Department of Human Services.

Since moving to Saskatchewan in 2013, Susannah has worked as a sessional instructor in Indigenous Social Work and was hired to the Faculty of Indigenous Social Work in 2019. She worked at a nonprofit in North Central Regina as Program Director, focused on work with Indigenous youth, and now serves on the Board of Directors. She has also served on the Regina Homelessness Community Advisory Board.

In June 2025, Susannah graduated with her doctoral degree from the Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy, and she successfully defended her dissertation on the impact of cultural connection on the mental health of on-reserve Indigenous youth. She is an Odawa language learner with the tribal language program through Bay Mills Community College in Michigan.

Margaret has significantly contributed to Cree language revitalization, developing curriculum and writing three Cree Immersion documents.

Inspired by her father, she hopes to pass on the importance of the language and culture to future generations. In her free time, she enjoys working on language projects, facilitating workshops, walking, singing, playing guitar, performing at local coffee houses, cooking, baking, and writing.

Dumas is the author of the award-winning picture book Pīsim Finds Her Miskanow (2013), which is the first book in the Six Seasons of Asiniskaw Ithiniwak series. He is also the author of The Gift of the Little People (2022).

She was named a 2022-23 Action Canada Fellow.

She is honoured to advocate for First Nations students in receiving the best possible education, now, and for future generations, and is learning how to be a good ancestor by spending time with the land, reflecting out of service in the bush, and nerding out about Indigenous policy, politics and systems design.

Shardae is Anishinaabe kwe and mixed settler, a member of Red Rock Indian Band and a member lawyer of the Law Society of Ontario. She is fortunate to have grown up in and live in the traditional territory of her ancestors, the Robinson Superior Treaty. She will be a Hide Helper at SEP. Rooted in a desire to honour the animals that sustain her people, Shardae began learning the traditional practice of hide tanning four years ago. Her journey into this ancestral skill was born from a commitment to making use of every part of the animal—a practice steeped in reverence, responsibility, and gratitude. Guided by the teachings of her ancestors and contemporary mentors, she strives to uphold traditional methods and materials, embracing the slow, physical, and ceremonial process that tanning requires.

For Shardae, hide tanning is more than a craft—it is an act of remembering, a method of healing, and a way to reconnect with the land, her community, and herself.




Bernard Ryan Bucao
